I am pleased to report that the Boone and Crockett Club continues to stand at the pinnacle of North American conservation organizations.

This annual accounting of the Club's activities offers a broad perspective on our core tenets: conservation and conservation policy, education, fair chase and ethical hunting, wildlife health, and science-based record keeping.

Our vision draws upon the 138-year history of North America's oldest conservation organization—serving the hunting community, scientific researchers, state and federal game managers, and policy decision-makers at every level of government. While our foundation was built by the visionaries who came before us, the future of that vision rests in the capable hands of our leadership, staff, members, donors, and all who support our mission through their generous gifts of time, talent, and treasure.

I want to recognize our hard-working staff in Missoula, who not only kept the Club's day-to-day

operations running smoothly this past year, but also planned and flawlessly executed the 32nd Big Game Awards in Springfield, Missouri, at Bass Pro Shops' Wonders of Wildlife Museum in July.

The Club's officers, board members, executive vice presidents, committee chairs and vice chairs, committee members, and volunteers—on both the Club and Foundation sides—contribute thousands of hours annually to fundraise, support, and advance the objectives and goals of our mission.

I would especially like to thank the management committee, Mary Webster, Steve Leath, Terrell McCombs and Ben Strickling for their unwavering support during my tenure as president. I am confident that the future of the Club is secure in their capable hands. My wife, Ginny, has also been an invaluable partner this past year—organizing and planning spouse activities and assisting with critical aspects of our upcoming annual meeting in Scottsdale. For this, I am deeply grateful.

This past fiscal year has brought challenges as we navigate a new administration and the changes that come with it in Washington, D.C. Yet with those challenges come new opportunities, and we find hope and inspiration in many of these developments. Under the capable leadership of James Cummins and Simon Roosevelt, our policy team continues to make great strides in the conservation policy arena. Their work was instrumental in getting forestry provisions included in the EXPLORE Act that was signed into law at the end of the 118th Congress, as well as completing and distributing the seventh volume of AWCP's Wildlife for the 21st Century report.

Our institutional strength also supports excellence across other initiatives, most notably our University Programs. Through the generosity of dedicated supporters, professorships at major universities have been established to ensure that the North American Model of Conservation is instilled in future generations. Under Steve Leath's leadership, these programs continue to expand.

In addition to our University Programs, the Demmer Scholars initiative continues to grow and was recognized with the Club's Conservation and Stewardship Award. Likewise, our Outdoor Adventure Camp at the ranch continues to see record-setting participation each summer.

The Boone and Crockett Foundation, under the leadership of Terrell McCombs, remains in tremendous shape. Through careful and





thoughtful stewardship of our physical and financial resources, the Foundation ensures our endurance for many years to come. As a testament to this success, the Wilderness Warriors Society now stands at 62 members.

Big Game Records continues to reach new milestones, both in the number of entries during the past three-year awards period and in record-breaking attendance at the Springfieldbanquets. These achievements serve as a testament to sound wildlife management and habitat conservation—proof that world records can still be broken, something our founders could scarcely have imagined.

Yet even with these successes, wildlife health remains one of our greatest ongoing challenges. The Club will continue to dedicate resources toward research with our many partners in this critical area. While many species are thriving, our wild sheep and deer face localized disease challengesthatcontinuetospreadatunprecedented rates. Additionally, the New World screwworm poses a serious emerging threat—one that must be quickly contained and eradicated before it reaches our borders.

The work ahead demands much from all of us. As you will see in this annual report, the Boone and Crockett Club is supported by a generous community united by a passion for wildlife and wild places—people whose ambitions are limited only by imagination. We will always be tested: by anti-hunters, by nature, and even by those within our own ranks. But we will emerge stronger—not in spite of criticism, but because of it.

Boone and Crockett will always take the high road. We will always make the chase fair. We will always celebrate the animals and our passion for hunting them. And in doing so, we will continue to make the world of hunting a better place.

BOONE AND CROCKETT CLUB FOUNDATION PRESIDENT

FY 2025 was a good year for the Boone and Crockett Club Foundation. Total Foundation outlays to the Club totaled \$1,455,853. Total Foundation receipts totaled \$1,602,775 during the same period. Total asset value for the Foundation, including Gift Annuities, totaled \$30,432,977 on June 30, 2025, the end of the fiscal year. This marks the first time that Foundation assets have exceeded \$30,000,000 at the end of a fiscal year. Thank you.

It takes resolute people to make both the Club and its Foundation work. The staff has been a tremendous benefit, particularly Jodi Bishop, our multi-talented staff liaison. Jodi's talent and hard work often go unnoticed. I will assure you it would soon become very noticeable without Jodi's work and commitment to the Foundation. Thank you, Jodi.

Charles Hartford, Investment Committee Chairman, continues to lead this critical, intelligent group with exceptional skill. They have effectively navigated the complex market conditions experienced this year and achieved positive results.

The Foundation Endowment ended Fiscal Year 2025 with an ROI of 11.29%, an exceptional return for a conservative group of investments. I would like to personally thank Mr. Hartford and his diligent Committee for a job well done.

The Foundation's Wilderness Warrior Society enjoyed one of the best years in its history, gaining eight new members, bringing total membership to 62—what a milestone! Society members have pledged over \$9 million since the program began. The new Society inductees are Mr. Weldon Baird, Mrs. Linda Demmer, Mrs. Arlene Hanson, Mr. John Hopkins, Mr. Bill Jones, Mr. Dave Rippeto, Mr. Louis Rupp, and Mr. Thomas Teague. This esteemed group will join their Society brethren in Scottsdale, AZ on the evening of Monday, December 1, 2025, to kick off the Annual Meeting with an exclusive private reception and dinner in their honor. The Wilderness Warrior Society is the Foundation's premier major gift program. Members receive a custom TR bronze, a custom fitted sports coat, and a copy of Wilderness Warrior, Douglas Brinkley's famous treatise

on the life of our Founder, Theodore Roosevelt. I would like to thank every Society member for their commitment to go "above and beyond" for the continued conservation of America's wildlife and the wild places they call home.

The George Bird Grinnell Society welcomes those individuals who wish to support the Club's conservation programs with philanthropic, tax-deductible gifts of \$2,500 or more. It has received \$1.4 million to date from 30 members. Thank you for helping us promote our conservation mission.

The Guns for Conservation program and Chairman Johnny Evans' Development Committee continue to assist the Club and Foundation in so many ways. Guns for Conservation has brought in more than \$172,000 in firearms and sporting collectables to date with more than \$7,000 in inventory yet to be sold. Families inheriting firearms collections may be uncertain about how to manage them after a relative passes away. Guns for Conservation can solve that issue, disposing of the firearms at their maximum auction value and




ENDOWMENT BALANCES



offering the estate or individual a significant tax deduction. The Development Committee, under the leadership of Mr. Johnny Evans, offered two member-oriented solicitations this year. The Fall 2024 solicitation offered a pair of Vortex binoculars for gifts of \$300 or more. It raised more than \$42,000. The Spring 2025 solicitation brought in \$7,000. Thank you, Johnny, for your efforts on behalf of the Club. All Development Committee receipts go directly to fund Club programs related to its mission. Speaking of thanks, I cannot thank Mike Opitz enough for originating the Guns for Conservation program for us. Mike deserves all the credit for getting this great program up and running. Thank you, Mike.

Mike Opitz and Mike Evans continued their leadership as co-chairs of the Auction Committee. This is no easy task. It is safe to say that without this important Committee the Club would genuinely struggle to meet its annual budget. All auction proceeds go directly toward Club conservation programs. This year has been especially challenging for this team, as they have had to put together three separate auctions within 12 months. These include the 2024 Annual Meeting Auction in Charlotte, which brought in more than \$250,000. The 32nd Big Game Awards Auction in Springfield brought in more than \$226,000 for the Big Game Records Program, and this committee is presently finishing preparations for

the 2025 Annual Meeting Auction in Scottsdale. The committee is responsible for many important tasks. They would surely value any assistance you can offer. Thank you, committee members, for all you do for our Club!

Planned Giving is the most critical part of the Foundation and is essential to the future of the Boone and Crockett Club. Winton Smith, our estate planning authority, has continued his hugely beneficial work for the Foundation. Our premier Planned Giving Society, the Roughriders Society, now has a total of 110 members. Several Roughriders will attend the Annual Meeting wearing gold lapel pins to indicate their membership. The Roughriders Society is for all those who have left a beguest to the Boone and Crockett Club in their estate plans. There is no minimum amount, and it can include stock, cash, or real estate. Depending on how the bequest is set up, it may offer considerable tax benefits as well. Winton Smith, our paid staff consultant on such matters, can guide you wisely and assist your attorney in document preparation. There is no charge for Winton's services. They are all paid by the Foundation. All conversations remain strictly confidential. All current non-matured bequests total more than \$71,500,000. Matured beguests and those converted to current gifts for tax reasons total \$13,573,576 since the beginning of this program a little over a decade ago. Thank you, Winton, for all your hard work for the Club and its members over the last year.

The Hall of Fame is composed of individuals who have contributed \$500,000 or more to the Club over their tenure in the Club. It is currently composed of 26 members. Our two most recent Hall of Fame


CONSERVATION POLICY

Wildlife for the 21st Century, Volume VII

In September 2024, the American Wildlife Conservation Partners (AWCP), comprised of the nation's top 52 sporting-conservation organizations that represent America's hunter-conservationists, professional wildlife and natural resource managers, outdoor recreation users, conservation educators, and wildlife scientists, released Wildlife for the 21st Century, Volume VII (W-21). This comprehensive report focuses on solutions to conserve wildlife and their habitats across the nation, bolstering public access, and protecting our outdoor traditions. The recommendations in W-21 will aid policymakers in the Trump Administration and 119th and 120th Congresses in making decisions on sporting-conservation issues and practices that are vital to current and future generations of sportsmen and sportswomen and other conservationists. Club leaders, members, staff, and contractors played a leading role in convening our partners and assembling this document.

EXPLORE Act

The Boone and Crockett Club worked to include provisions of the Treating Tribes and Counties as Good Neighbors Act within the Expanding Public Lands Out-



door Recreation Experiences (EX-PLORE) Act that was signed into law in mid-January. Good Neighbor Authority—a concept championed by the Club since the early 2000s —allows the U.S. Department of Agriculture and Department of the Interiortoenterintoagreementswith state forestry agencies to conduct management projects on federal forest lands to improve their ecological resilience and reduce the threat from catastrophic wildfires. The provisions in the EXPLORE Act will now allow the Forest Service and Bureau of Land Management to enter into similar agreements with tribes and counties to ensure projects can be implemented across land ownership types.

FISCAL YEAR 2025

Active Forest Management

In January 2025, the U.S. House of Representatives passed the Fix Our Forests Act (H.R. 8790)—a top B&C legislative priority—by a bipartisan vote of 268-151. This legislation would allow the U.S. Forest Service to accelerate active forest management on our national forests to reduce the risk of severe wildfires, improve big game habitat, and create jobs in rural communities. The Club will remain engaged in the new fiscal year to pass this legislation in the Senate and have it signed into law by the President.

Big Game Migration

The Club's conservation policy team worked to support the introduction of the "Wildlife Movement Through Partnerships Act" in the 118th Congress. The legislation would provide funding to improve habitat in big game migration and seasonal range and formalize the Department of the Interior's discretionary program established in 2018 under Secretary's Order 3362. The program has proven since its inception that non-federal habitat projects are effective and respectful of property rights and multiple-use management of federal lands. Work continues to move the bill over the finish line, while also working with the new administration to improve implementation of the program under existing authority.

The summer meeting of AWCP was held in Missoula in August 2024, and the Club hosted more than 50 conservation partners for a dinner on the headquarters lawn to celebrate the success of the collaboration.

State Conservation Policy

The Boone and Crockett Club's state level engagement is driven by the interest of our regular and professional members, in partnership with the Congressional Sportsmen's Foundation's State Policy Team. In FY2025, our team worked on member priorities in Alabama, Colorado, Idaho, Indiana, Michigan, Montana, South Carolina, Tennessee, Texas, Wisconsin, and Wyoming.

In addition, Club CEO Tony Schoonen participated in several events hosted by the Western Governors' Association focusing on private land conservation, active forest management, energy, and public land sales.

COLORADO'S PROPOSITION 127

Colorado was at the center of a heated debate over wildlife management, sparked by a ballot initiative that sought to ban the hunting of large cats, including mountain lions, bobcats, and lynx. This initiative was concerning to conservation groups and hunters, including the Boone and Crockett Club, who believe that such measures undermine science-based wildlife management. The Club, in partnership with Coloradans' for Responsible Wildlife Management—led by campaign manager and professional member Mark Truax—was successful in defeating this ill-reasoned proposal.

To help in the fight, the Club engaged our members through emails and webinars, including working with emeritus member Arlene Hanson to place an opinion article opposing the initiative that ran in the Colorado Springs Gazette.



Farm Bill

To support the push for Farm Bill reauthorization before the end of the 118th Congress, past president James Cummins published opinion pieces in some of the largest newspapers in Arizona, Michigan, New Mexico, and Virginia, targeting members of the Senate Agriculture Committee. Though the bill never received a floor vote, in early 2025 the policy team worked with members of Congress to introduce legislation to create a new Forest Conservation Easement Program within the Farm Bill.

In addition, the policy team worked to secure long-term funding for the Farm Bill's major conservation programs through the One Big Beautiful Bill Act. Signed on July 4, 2025, this law integrates Inflation Reduction Act (IRA) funds into the permanent Farm Bill baseline, which is projected to direct more than \$50 billion in mandatory funding to conservation programs between FY2025 and FY2034.

Public Land Disposal

When two legislative attempts were made in the budget reconciliation process to sell federal lands and send the proceeds to the U.S. Treasury, the Club's conservation policy team got involved. We released two public statements opposing the effort and our Washington, DC, team worked on Capitol Hill to convey our position to key members of Congress. These provisions were ultimately removed from the budget process.

The Club recognizes that necessary land management and improvement efforts are often delayed by overly burdensome or misapplied environmental review processes. We will continue to work with Congress, the Administration, and conservation partners to ensure that the existing authorities for selling or exchanging certain parcels of federal land can be exercised more efficiently to advance conservation goals.

The U.S. federal public land estate is one of our nation's greatest legacies—an inheritance that the Boone and Crockett Club will defend and support forever. Since our founding in 1887, the Club has stood firm in opposition whenever proposals arise to dispose of public lands for short-term revenue. That commitment remains unwavering today. A cash sale produces only one kind of return from an asset: the final one. In contrast, the continuous returns from owning and managing public lands flow from their responsible use and enjoyment. These returns may be economic, ecological, cultural, or recreational, but together they generate true national wealth in the form of commerce, health, tradition, and commitment to the land.

FISCAL YEAR 2025

University Programs

In early June, University Programs held a retreat at the Club's Theodore Roosevelt Memorial Ranch. Libby Metcalf, interim Dean of Franke College of Forestry and Conservation at the University of Montana, served as facilitator for the 20 participants, which included regular Club members, professional members, B&C staff, and fellows from three Universities. Input and guidance from Club leadership, especially Tony Caligiuri, Mary Webster, Steve Leath, and Tony Schoonen was appreciated. Participants reviewed priorities from the last retreat and chose three priorities to focus on, with an emphasis on action items including two new outreach efforts.

"What's U.P.?" is a monthly feature in the member's newsletter highlighting the Club's University Programs (U.P.) and its fellows. Each month will highlight a different University Program and give readers a quick look into the valuable work these campuses, their faculty, and especially our B&C fellows are accomplishing.

The University Programs biannual webinar series will bring in wildlife conservation professionals to connect with fellows and share experiences and knowledge. Topics will include how to get the most out of professional conferences, how to work with elected officials, and best practices for communicating with the public, just to name a few.





The 2024 Conservation and Stewardship Award was presented to Bill and Linda Demmer and Mark Rey for their vision and leadership in developing and implementing the William A. Demmer Scholars Program. The Award was presented during the Club's annual Spring Meeting held at the 90th North American Wildlife and Natural Resources Conference in Louisville, Kentucky.



This semester we have 21 Boone and Crockett Fellows spread across seven active programs. Four are post-doctoral researchers, 12 are working on their PhD, four students are completing a master's degree, while one student is in an undergraduate program completing a bachelor's in wildlife ecology and management.



At the 2024 Annual Meeting, Mr.
Landon Magee received the Boone
and Crockett Fellow Outstanding
Achievement in Graduate Research
Award. Magee, a fellow co-advised
by Dr. Joshua Millspaugh and Chad
Bishop, is studying moose abundance
and calf recruitment on the Blackfeet
Reservation in Montana. Landon is
an exemplary Boone and Crockett
Fellow—he is an outstanding student,
has tremendous experience in tribal
wildlife research and management,
and will undoubtedly be a conservation
leader in the near future.

Theodore Roosevelt Memorial Ranch

The Ranch faced low snowpack and lower precipitation this year. In addition to lower stocking rates, the conditions have led to the development of management projects to support the sustainability and security of the ranch.

Around the ranch yard, the removal of dead trees and brush and thinning in the understory of the groves of trees around our buildings will help reduce fire threats to our infrastructure.

In addition, B&C staff developed a forestry project along the border with the national forest that would help prevent or minimize wildfire impact on the ranch, restore stream flow in our springs and creeks, create better habitat for wildlife and livestock, and utilize our partnership with the University of Montana to determine the actual impact and results of the project on the landscape and wildlife. When funded the project will be an outstanding demonstration of the potential for sustainable forest management projects to improve working lands and improve forest and habitat health.

Irrigation infrastructure improvements will help support the ranch's native grass pastures and support the cattle operation. We are also looking to demonstrate how the innovative irrigation system used on the ranch is helping to support sustainable stream flows.

B&C'S CONSERVATION EDUCATION & TRM RANCH 2025 BY THE NUMBERS

In FY2025, we directly influenced over 4,825 individuals through place-based and off-site conservation education programs, plus tens of thousands more virtually.

This summer, the Club's place-based conservation education programs hosted 17 field trips, which included 36 teachers and over 350 students.

Montana High Adventure Base scouts included 60 scouts from 7 different states who floated and hiked through the 1 million+ acre Bob Marshall Wilderness! Many were repeat customers.

Two amazing summer interns, both from the University of Montana, helped pull off 3 Outdoor Adventure Camps jam packed with 45 middle and high school aged campers.

The Rasmuson Wildlife Conservation Center hosted 7 NGO workshops and retreats including a Master Naturalist field course finale, the Montana Wild Sheep Foundation summer board meeting, and the Institute for Journalism & Natural Resources.

This fall we hosted the annual University of Montana Wild Sustenance field weekend course, a Montana Fish, Wildlife & Parks non-game biologists work group retreat, and off-site conferences hosted by the Association of Fish and Wildlife Agencies and The Wildlife Society.





Women's Outdoor Skills Retreat

The 2025 Women's Retreat empowered women to build confidence in outdoor skills through hands-on workshops in trailer backing, fire-starting, shooting sports, pottery, yoga, and native plant uses. The program's success highlighted the importance of creating space for women to learn, connect, and lead in conservation—set against the unforgettable backdrop of the Rocky Mountain Front.

FISCAL YEAR 2025

Records Program Changes

At the December 2024 Annual Meeting, the Records Committee voted unanimously to approve three significant program changes.

The Club created a new records category for javelina, the first new category since 2001 and the first new species added since 1998 when California's tule elk were added. The proposal to add javelina was brought forward to the Records Committee by a working group made up of wildlife managers from Texas, New Mexico, Arizona, and Mexico as well as other hunting conservation groups. The Records Committee coordinated with the Pope and Young Club through the spring and summer to set minimums and develop scoring procedures, officially welcoming entries to the new category in August 2025.


Bison hunted on the Fort Peck Indian Reservation in northern Montana are now eligible for the Records Program. The decision recognizes the Tribes' success in building a wild, free-ranging bison herd on their reservation using a sustainable management plan since the first bison were transferred to the reservation from Yellowstone National Park in 1999.

Shiras' moose taken in the state of Nevada are now included in the B&C Record Book after the Nevada Department of Wildlife petitioned to update the subspecies' boundaries. Moose have been expanding into northeast Nevada and the agency opened a hunting season when it determined that hunter harvest is sustainable and could also provide critical biological information.

Pope and Young Biennial Convention

The Records team continued our longstanding partnership with the Pope and Young Club at their 34th Biennial Convention in Glendale, Arizona, in April. In addition to our booth within the exhibit hall, staff offered an abbreviated training session to those Official Measurers who are only certified through Pope and Young. The well-attended workshop focused on the history of the Boone and Crockett Club and our records program, as well as highlighting the differences between the two organizations. At the Convention, we also presented our Fair Chase award to Ted Carlson for his tremendous Alaskan grizzly bear.

OFFICIAL MEASURER WORKSHOPS

The records team helped train 64 new Official Measurers during the fiscal year. This brings our total Official Measurer count to over 1,600—the largest cadre of Official Measurers in the Club's history!

While the 32nd Big Game Awards event officially happened in the new fiscal year, much of the work and preparation took place in FY2025. The Judges Panel and Media Summit convened in April scoring the 93 animals—including three new World's Records—sent in for the display, an increase of 22 mounts from the 31st Awards. In addition, 38 youth hunters had their animals included in the Jack Steele Parker Generation Next display, an increase of 11 from the previous Awards. The exhibit opened in the Bucks and Bulls Hall of Johnny Morris' Wonders of Wildlife National Museum and Aquarium in early May and nearly 120,000 people toured the exhibit before it closed on July 26. Overall, more than 500 people attended the events that took place in Springfield, Missouri, in late July.

Media Summit

Simultaneous to the Judges Panel in April, a group of 11 outdoor writers took part in a Media Summit to learn about the measuring process as well as the history of the Club, our big game records program, and our conservation and education activities. This year's agenda also in-

cluded two "off the record" sessions discussing challenging topics including technology and "trophy hunting". We had writers and editors from Sports Afield, Field & Stream, MeatEater, Petersen's Hunting, Game & Fish, North American Whitetail, Hook & Barrel magazine, Hunting Life, and Women's Outdoor News, as well as a couple freelancers working for a variety of publications. The Summit resulted in excellent media coverage to help promote the display and encourage attendance at the Big Game Awards event in July.

Fair Chase in the Awards Display

The Hunter and Conservation Ethics subcommittee initiated several educational posters about Fair Chase ethics that were integrated into the Big Game Awards and Generation Next Displays. As part of this, visitors who embraced the Fair Chase Statement submitted their contact information to receive a Hunt Fair Chase decal, and so far, we have received over 1,400 email addresses.





Sagamore Hill Award

The Club honored Justin Kallusky with the Sagamore Hill Award for his 2022 hunt near the Stikine River in British Columbia that culminated in the World's Record Rocky Mountain goat. This prestigious award originated in 1947 when several Club members, including Archibald Roosevelt, decided to create a memorial to Theodore Roosevelt. The award recognizes an outstanding animal in the Big Game Awards, as well as the hunter's skills, conservation awareness, and fair chase pursuit—and honors Theodore Roosevelt's vision for the Club. The Sagamore Hill Award is only presented periodically and Kallusky is the first recipient in 15 years, joining 18 previous awardees.







The 32nd Big Game Awards banquet was named in recognition of B&C Honorary Life Member Buck Buckner who became an Official Measurer in 1968 and most recently served as Vice President of Big Game Records before stepping back a few years ago to spend more time with his family.



In the Press

For fiscal year 2025, our media tracking service identified 617 stories that mentioned the Boone and Crockett Club with 195 being earned media—these had a potential reach of more than 4.2 billion views! While this doesn't necessarily translate into actual views of these stories, a new tracking insight estimates our actual views being over 2 million.


In The Field E-Newsletter

Our In the Field newsletter goes out to over 200,000 subscribers twice every month. It features the latest content from our website, covering everything from University Programs Fellow profiles and member spotlights to scoring tips and hunting stories. The goal of the newsletter is to inform all our members and supporters about Club activity and drive traffic back to the website. At the same time, it's used as a vehicle to drive merchandise sales and provide sponsorship opportunities.



Fair Chase Magazine

Fair Chase magazine is the flagship publication of the Boone and Crockett Club, arriving in mailboxes every quarter. Over the past couple years, we have "re-imagined" the magazine to center some of its content on themes relevant to the Club and its members. Recent themes have included wild game cooking, deer, restoration, public land, and bears. This approach allows us to provide stimulating content while delivering impactful stories on how the Club is working to solve the issues affecting conservation today.



Trailblazers in Conservation


In the beginning of this fiscal year, our team worked to revamp the corporate partner program creating sponsor level tiers to increase revenue and advertising. For FY25 our total Trailblazer and advertising revenue was over \$166,000, an increase of nearly \$50,000 over FY24. Additionally, the team was focused on geting sponsor support for the Big Game Awards resulting in a total of \$198,000 of cash and in-kind product donations for the awards program.



COMMUNICATIONS SURVEY

We surveyed our members to gather insights into the best ways to share information and the Members' Newsletter (89.3%), Fair Chase (62.5%), and in-person meetings (57.8%) were identified as the best avenues. Using this information and other details from the survey, the entire staff will continue to work to provide timely information and improve the channels we use to communicate with our members.

This chart shows the total number of associates that signed up or renewed over the last four fiscal years.




B&C Booth

With the success of last year's trade show booth, we again participated in the Dallas Safari Club Convention and Sheep Show. In addition, this year we added the Western Hunting and Conservation Expo and hosted a well-attended breakfast at the Safari Club International convention at the IW Marriott hotel in Nashville. The result of these efforts was increased visibility for the Boone and Crockett Club, and a total of 284 new grassroots members including eight new Lifetimes for membership revenue of more than \$23,000. Beyond the fiscal returns, the booth provides an important opportunity to build our brand visibility and to create better relationships with potential new corporate partners and regular members.

Wildlife Art and Conservation

During a unique event at the National Museum of Wildlife Art in Jackson Hole, Wyoming, a special exhibit of the works of Bob Kuhn presented an opportunity to link the history of art and conservation. Professional member Tim Shinabarger gave a compelling presentation about how artists like Albert Bierstadt, Alexander Proctor, Carl Akeley, Carl Rungius and others who were members of the Boone and Crockett Club have helped to communicate the importance of conservation to the public through their art.

The Boone and Crockett Club and Foundation remained aligned with the objectives outlined in the strategic plan, supported by members, donors, and the Foundation's endowment. Combined revenues for the organizations increased by \$2.1 million. Year-over-year revenues were generally consistent between FY24 and FY25, with the primary variance attributable to an increase in contributions. During FY25, the Foundation recognized two new Charitable Remainder Trust agreements that were funded during the fiscal year. On the expense side, administrative expenditures decreased by 2.71%, while fundraising costs increased by 4.39% and program service expenses rose by 3.65%. Special thanks to Ben Strickling and Abra Loran for their diligent work to maintain and report on the Club's sound financial standing.




SPONSORSHIPS

INVESTMENT REPORT

I am pleased to report that the investments that underpin both the Boone and Crockett Club's Endowment, as well as ongoing operations, enjoyed another successful year. Investment accounts ended FY25 on June 30, 2025, with total assets valued at \$30,432,977. As of October 31, 2025, the total assets are valued at \$32,502,787. It remains invested in a manner fully consistent with our Investment Policy Statement (IPS). This total includes our endowment balance, depot mortgage, and gift annuities.

The Endowment continued to perform ahead of our targeted goal of a 4% annual return. As of June 30, 2025, the net rate of return for the previous 12 months was 11.29%. Our net rate of return for the previous 5 years, an important data point as we consider impacts to the Endowment's corpus, increased from 7.28% in 2024 to 8.85%.

While the Investment Committee approved a motion to allow for a 5% increase in equities exposure,

we maintained our current asset allocation of 65% equities and 35% fixed income and cash. Equities remain weighted towards high quality, dividend generating companies, with nearly 25% of the portfolio in large cap value names. We expect to maintain this continued bias over companies with stretched valuations.

Our cash operational reserve continued to provide a consistency to funding requirements. Annual dividend and yield income increased from the previous year to \$627,423 from \$452,242 in FY24.

The Endowment maintains a virtually infinite time horizon; while we anticipate normal and episodic market pullbacks and the impacts those may have on our portfolio in the short term, the Investment Committee still prioritizes allocation discipline, cash management, and quality earnings and management as our basis for the long-term vitality of the club's financial support.

The Investment Committee's members remain earnest to serve

the needs of the Club by protecting and growing the Endowment for years and generations to come. We owe a debt of thanks to the remarkable members of this committee for the responsibility they carry on behalf of the Club. Their approach and oversight provide a foundation of trust for those with the means to provide financial support to the Club's Endowment and help preserve our hunting heritage and conservation legacy.

Thank you to our partners and staff for the superb job they do; they deserve our thanks and gratitude. As always, I bear full responsibility for any errors or omissions in this annual report, and I am honored to serve alongside those who make this work so meaningful.


